 1 Frontier elm *Ulmus* ‘Frontier’ on west side of NE 31<sup>st</sup>. - 2003  
 1 Purple European beech *Fagus sylvatica* ‘Riversii’ on west side of NE 31<sup>st</sup>. - 2004
- 3041** 1 Silver linden *Tilia tomentosa* ‘Sterling’ - 2004  
 2 Tupelos *Nyssa sylvatica* – on west side of NE 31<sup>st</sup>. - 2004
- 3116** 2 American hornbeams *Carpinus caroliniana*  
 Native to eastern U.S. 2004 See 1134
- 5955** NE 32<sup>nd</sup> 1 Bambooleaf oak *Quercus myrsinaefolia* – 2003 Evergreen oak from Japan with unlobed leaves. New growth briefly tinged purplish.
- 3217** 2 Sweet gums *Liquidambar styraciflua* See 2207
- 3236** 1 Deodar cedar *Cedrus deodar* in yard
- 3253** 2 Honey locusts *Gleditsia triacanthos* – on east side of NE 32<sup>nd</sup> Place.
- 3267** 1 Atlas cedar *Cedrus libanii* ssp. *atlantica* in yard.
- 3425** 1 Oregon white oak *Quercus garryana* – 2004
- 3576** 1 Natchez crape myrtle *Lagerstroemia x fauriei* ‘Natchez’ – 2003 Compact hybrid has showy white flowers for long period in summer, cinnamon-colored bark, red to orange fall color.
- 3624** 2 Sweet gums *Liquidambar styraciflua* See 2207
- 3627** 1 Tricolor European beech *Fagus sylvatica* ‘Roseomarginata’

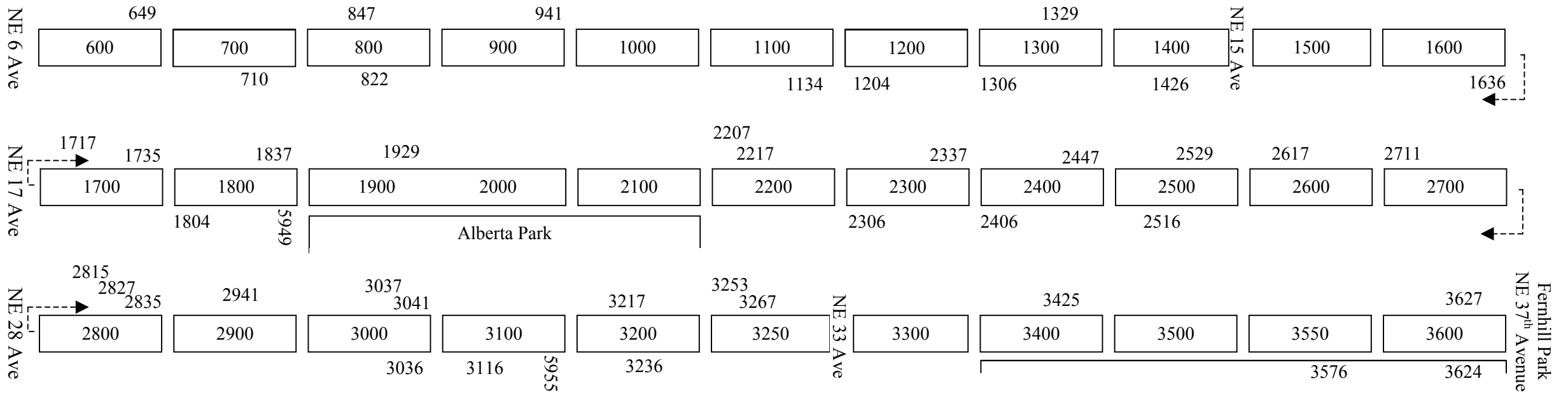
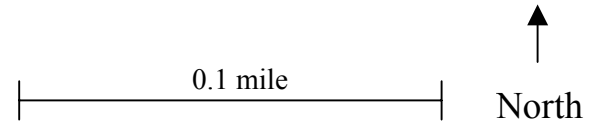

# Ainsworth Linear Arboretum



The Ainsworth Linear Arboretum is located along NE Ainsworth Boulevard from NE 6<sup>th</sup> Ave to NE 37<sup>th</sup>, in Portland Oregon. Numbers on this map correlate to the house address. The year refers to the year the tree was planted by Friends of Trees.

- 649** 2 horse chestnuts *Aesculus hippocastaneum* European native. Nuts are poisonous.
- 710** 2 Paperbark maples (*Acer griseum*). - 2003 1 Bambooleaf oak *Quercus myrsinaefolia* Rare Asian evergreen oak. - 2003
- 842** 1 Queen Elizabeth hedge maple *Acer campestre*. - 2003 1 Tatarian maple *Acer tataricum*. -2003 in the middle
- 879** 3 Magyar ginkgos *Ginkgo biloba* ‘Magyar’ - 2004 Chinese native can live centuries. Resists air pollution. Disease and pest free. Yellow fall color. Fruitless male clone.
- 941** 2 Paperbark maples *Acer griseum* Native to China. Red fall color, attractive peeling bark.
- 1134** 2 Japanese hornbeam *Carpinus japonica* Mostly troublefree and tidy – 2005. 1 Heartleaf hornbeam *Carpinus cordata*. - 2005

- 1204** 2 American hophornbeams *Ostrya virginiana*. 2004 2 American hornbeams *Carpinus caroliniana* – on 12<sup>th</sup> Street. – 2004 Native to the eastern U.S., papery nutlets in fall. Leaves cling to tree into winter. Extremely rare in Portland. Eastern U.S. native with strong wood, orange-tinged fall color, papery nutlets.
- 1306** 1 Chinese dogwood *Cornus kousa* – 2003 1 Southern magnolia *Magnolia grandiflora* ‘Edith Bogue’. -2003
- 1329** 1 Oregon white oak *Quercus garryana* 2003 Native from British Columbia to Oregon. Can live 300 years.
- 1426** Lavalley Hawthorn *Crataegus x lavallei*
- 1636** 1 Deodar cedar *Cedrus deodar* in yard
- 1715** 1 Eastern redbud *Cercis canadensis* Rosy purple flowers in spring. Fast growth but short lived.
- 1735** 2 Katsura *Cercidiphyllum japonicum* Attractive fall color. Native to Japan and China, needs summer water to look best. Leafs out and drops leaves early.
- 1804** 3 Snow gums *Eucalyptus pauciflora* ssp. *niphophila* – in yard. Planted 2004
- 1814** 1 Saucer magnolia *Magnolia x soulangeana*
- 5949** NE 19<sup>th</sup> 1 Korean mountain ash *Sorbus alnifolia* –

- westernmost of 2 trees. - 2004
- 1837** 1 Southern magnolia *Magnolia grandiflora* Evergreen tree from the eastern U.S. Large scented white flowers off and on through summer.
- 1929** 2 Tulip trees *Liriodendron tulipifera* From the southern and eastern U.S. Greenish-white flowers often hidden by leaves. Yellow fall color. Attracts aphids.
- Alberta Park** 3 Yellowwoods *Cladrastis kentukea*. -2004
- 2207** 2 Sweet gums *Liquidambar styraciflua* Often breaks in ice storms. Shallow surface roots lift sidewalks. Grown for pretty fall color but produces large crops of spiky “gumball” fruits that litter ground.
- 2217** 1 Yellowwood *Cladrastis kentukea* - 2004 Wisteria-like white flowers, yellow fall color. Native to the Appalachias.
- 2306** 1 Yellow Fever magnolia *Magnolia x acuminata* ‘Yellow Fever’. - 2004 1 Coastal redwood *Sequoia sempervirens* in yard
- 2337** 1 Kentucky coffee tree *Gymnocladus dioicus* 2004 2 Mountain silverbells *Halesia monticola* on west side of NE 24<sup>th</sup>. White flowers in spring - 2004
- 2406** 1 Atlas cedar *Cedrus libanii* ssp. *atlantica* in yard
- 2417** 1 Chinese dogwood *Cornus kousa* 2004 China native

- with showy white flowers, large pink fruits, red fall color, attractive mottled bark with age. Needs summer watering to do best.
- 2516** 2 Persian ironwoods *Parrotia persica*. - 2004
- 2529** 1 Kentucky coffee tree *Gymnocladus dioicus* 2004 Eastern U.S. native with sculpted bark, yellow fall color.
- 2617** 1 European beech *Fagus sylvatica* ‘Riversii’ Purple leaves, shade tolerant. Native to Europe.
- 2711** 1 Southern magnolia *Magnolia grandiflora* See 1837
- 2815** 1 Sweet gum *Liquidambar styraciflua* See 2207
- 2827** 2 Sweet gums *Liquidambar styraciflua* See 2207
- 2835** 3 Sweet gums *Liquidamber styraciflua* 1 Oregon white oak *Quercus garryana* in yard. See 2207 See 1329
- 2941** 5 Katsura *Cercidiphyllum japonicum* See 1735
- 3027** 2 Scarlet oaks *Quercus coccinea* - 2004 Strong-rooted, majestic tree can live hundreds of years. Magnificent red fall color. Native to eastern U.S.
- 3036** 1 Yellow Fever magnolia *Magnolia x acuminata* ‘Yellow Fever’ on Ainsworth –2004
