

Graffiti:

What does it say? What can YOU do about it?

Graffiti in Portland comes in 5 basic types:

- **TAGGER**
- **GANG**
- **COMMUNICATIVE**
- **HATE**
- **ART**

“TAGGER” graffiti is the most prevalent type in Portland. 80-85% of all graffiti in Portland fits this description. It may be simple line-letters, or elaborate, colorful designs, “pieces” or “throw-ups”. Most of the TAGGERS arrested in Portland ARE NOT juveniles (under 18 years of age)...the median age for TAGGERS in Portland is 20 years of age. Taggers may travel or associate with a “crew” whose members may all use one tag plus their own “moniker”, and hang out together...the photo shows a “roll call” of taggers around the monikers of “TAHOE” and “PESTOE”. Some taggers aspire to be recognized for their “ART”...larger, showier “pieces”...that may include a moniker in the colorful design.

Examples of local Tagger Crew tags:



- **AIDS** – Art Is Dying Slowly
- **PBSK** – Portland Bombing Squad Krew
- **NQD** – Not Quite Dead
- **HOD, HODK** – Hand of Doom
- **TMR** – Tokin’ Marijuana Religiously
- **GPK** – Garbage Pail Kids/GeePers
- **ADK** – All Day Killers
- **KWC** – Kuz We Can, Kids With Cans
- **TOC** – Toys Only Crew

**Note: “K” at the end refers to Krew*

GANG graffiti is growing in Portland. City-wide it accounts for 13-15% of all graffiti-vandalism. In some neighborhoods, it is a much higher percentage of the graffiti. GANG graffiti is the way gang members communicate with each other. Most of the GANG graffiti currently seen in Portland is done by Hispanic or Latino/Latina gang members or wanna-be’s. (A growing number of gang-vandals are young females). Also, most of the people arrested for doing GANG graffiti lately have been juveniles.

- **X3** – 13th St.
- **XV3** – 18th St.
- **BPC** – Brown Pride Chicana(s)
- **CVS** – Compton Varrio Segundo
- **310** – area code
- **PRB** – Paso Robles Boys
- **FK** – Family Kings
- **TLC** – Tiny Locos Clique
- **503** – area code

COMMUNICATIVE graffiti accounts for approximately 1.5% of all graffiti reported in Portland. This number may be higher in election years. Much of this graffiti is seen on City property, like STOP signs, because the vandal only has to write one or two words under STOP to get his message across.



HATE graffiti is less than 1% of all reported graffiti in the City. It can appear at specific times of the year. Satanic graffiti usually appears to be the work of kids trying it out...not an organized cult or group.



What can be done about Graffiti?

- Take Photos and send to Graffiti Abatement:
 - Digital photos (no larger than 1M, please) to: mdennis@ci.portland.or.us
 - Hard copies or Photo CDs to: 1221 SW 4th Ave, Rm. 110, Portland, OR 97204
- Remove it:
 - From your own property, paint it out, or check out a removal kit with solvent from one of 9 fire stations (kits contain solvent to be used to 'wipe-off' graffiti).
 - If you need **free** assistance, please call 503-823-5860 to put in a request if yours is owner-occupied residential property, non-profit, or small business location.
 - Volunteer to remove from properties in the right-of-way: Go to webpage at www.portlandonline.com/oni 'report a graffiti problem' and see sign up sheets, and other information about volunteering to remove graffiti.
 - Chronic locations – for your own property, contact your neighborhood **Crime Prevention Coordinator*** for free assistance in 'target-hardening' techniques, i.e., tips to make your property more secure and less vulnerable to graffiti and other vandalism.
- **Note:** All online reports are automatically sent to Graffiti Abatement for referral to responsible agency for removal. Public property is cleaned by a number of agencies, representing City of Portland; Multnomah County; Metro; State of Oregon; and US Postal Service to name a few.
- Graffiti vandals are arrested at an average rate of 3 per week. By reporting and accurately documenting the "tags", community members help the police and district attorneys build strong cases that will result in prosecution. Repeat offenders are often sentenced to jail time, and are also ordered to pay restitution to the victims. It is also helpful to have community members or businesses willing to testify or come to court for trial or sentencing of a convicted graffiti vandal. **Your help is important!**
