

1st Public Hearing for Comprehensive Plan Evaluation Rescheduled

You Spoke and We Heard You!

The City originally scheduled the first public hearing on the Comprehensive Plan Evaluation, the first step in the Portland Plan project, for March 25th in order to meet a state-required timeline. Individuals contacted the Bureau of Planning (Planning) asking for more time for public input. This meeting is now set for April 22nd (see other side for details).

Planning is seeking the state's approval for more time to prepare the Evaluation Report, the Portland Plan Public Engagement Strategy and the Work Program so you, the public, can have more input into these products and processes.

What is a Comp Plan?

The Comprehensive Plan (or Comp Plan) provides general direction for city decision-making on land use, transportation, parks, sewer and water systems, natural resources, and air and water quality management programs. All these things affect Portlanders' quality of life.

Why does it need to be "evaluated"?

The purpose of the evaluation is to look at the Comp Plan in light of current conditions and future trends. The Evaluation also determines whether or not a comp plan update is needed and helps to generate ideas for planning projects to be included in the official 3-year Work Program. The Evaluation also poses questions for a city-wide conversation about future decisions.




An Evaluation is part of periodic review, a state required plan examination, which is included in the Portland Plan process. The state requirements are just a place to begin for Portland.

Planning's evaluation focuses on: housing, economic development, transportation, sustainability, the environment, public facilities and urban form.

Over the past few months, city staff and other partners—in Technical Working Groups (TWGs) — conducted a wide-ranging evaluation in preparation for public review and input. These reports form the basis of the City's Evaluation. They are summarized in the "Comp Plan Evaluation Report."

What is the Portland Plan?

Over the next three years, Planning will be updating its [1980 Comprehensive Plan](#) and the [1988 Central City Plan](#) in an effort called the **Portland Plan**.

The Portland Plan is an inclusive, citywide effort to guide the physical, economic, social, cultural and environmental development of Portland over the next 30 years. The plan builds on the work the community did through [visionPDX](#), which fleshed out our shared values of sustainability, equity and accessibility, and community connectedness and distinctiveness.

The **Portland Plan** will satisfy the state's periodic review requirements and address other issues and opportunities to prudently guide the City in a manner that meets community needs & aspirations.
